Intelligence	Activities
Verbal Linguistic	Collaboration with group members, presenting final project (skit/brochure)
Mathematical/Logical	Analyzing group and individual rubrics for final score
Visual/Spatial	Watching the videos, visualizing bullying situations for skit/brochure
Bodily-Kinesthetic	Acting out their skits or handling their printed brochures, filling out their worksheets
Intrapersonal	Completing their individual roles: filling out their worksheets and completing their own research
Interpersonal	Working on their group projects with their peers: bullying definition, Venn Diagram, final project and presenting their work to the class
Musical	Music is presented in the videos they watch
Existential	Students are asked to understand and see different scenarios from the perspectives of other individuals.
